

### Village Officials Instruct Attorney to Continue Suit

Trustees Seek Quick Verdict in School Board Case Now Pending

D. B. Maloney, village attorney, reported to the village board Monday evening that he had filed in answer to the petition to dissolve the suit between the village of Barrington and trustees and directors of schools in Cuba township and part of Cook and McHenry counties in superior court of Cook county Monday. Arguments on the petition to dissolve will be heard January 5, he said. The petition was filed by R. J. and Bohanna, attorneys for the school districts, December 7. They contended that the case should be heard in Lake county and that the directors of school districts should not be named in the suit.

The village board Monday night instructed Mr. Maloney, after a motion by Trustee John Carroll, seconded by N. O. Plagge, to carry the case to whatever county is deemed upon January 5 in an effort to reach a settlement. Herman Kuhlman, president of the school board of Cuba township, in discussing the hearing of the case, denied statements that the case went to Cook county by previous agreement. Mr. Kuhlman stated that at no time did the board favor the case going to Cook county. He questioned the jurisdiction of a Cook county court in the matter. Mr. Maloney stated his view on the suit Monday night as in accordance with those offered by village officials. "It is inconceivable," he said, "that one body can spend the money of another without attempting to pay it back."

### A. Langto, Sr. Dies; Funeral Wednesday

Alexander J. Langto, Sr., 123 Wool street, who died Monday morning following a four-day illness, was buried after services conducted at the Bentley chapel in Chicago Wednesday afternoon with Duncan Mackie as reader. Interment was private. Services at Mr. Langto developed pneumonia last Friday morning. His condition was not considered grave at first but he sank into a coma Friday night and never regained consciousness. He was rushed to a Chicago hospital.

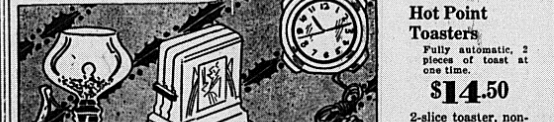
