

Re-appoint H. G. Zander Chairman of Federal Bank

Henry G. Zander, Sr., Cuba township has been re-appointed chairman and member of the board of the Federal Home Loan bank of Chicago, which serves the Illinois-Wisconsin district of savings, building and loan associations, according to word received by the regional bank from the Federal Home Loan bank board in Washington.

Mr. Zander, who has served as a director from the bank's inception four years ago, is in the classification "public interest director," and hence derives his appointment from the federal board. His new term as a director is for four years, starting January 1, 1937, and the chairmanship is a one-year appointment. He has been chairman since January 1, 1934.

The other three public interest directors in this district bank are holders from last year's appointments, Charles E. Broughton, newspaper publisher, Sheboygan, Wisconsin; Charles S. Kirkpatrick, furniture dealer, Lincoln, Illinois; and Judson G. Roebush, paper manufacturing executive, Appleton, Wisconsin.

Largest out of the twelve in the system, the Chicago Federal Home Loan bank is now a \$25,000,000 institution with approximately 500 local savings and loan institutions as its members, eligible to obtain credit.

Ghost of Old P. L. Z. & W. Walks the Board at Palatine Meeting

The ghost of the old Palatine, Lake Zurich and Wauconda railroad walked the boards and "strutted and fretted his hour" at a meeting of the Palatine village board in Palatine a week ago. The occasion for the return performance, the first having appeared many times in litigation since the death of the old railroad that served as a landmark of this section, was the presence of B. Lindner, who had just consummated a five year lease for that part of the old right of way which adjoins his lot on the south. He had secured his lease from the Elmhurst State bank, which seemed to think it had some claim to a title to the old right of way either as receivers or a tax title or something. Mr. Lindner had started to build a machine shed on the property when all of a sudden the information popped up that the property in question belonged to the village. It appears that the village at one time is thought to have had title to a strip along the railroad as well as the triangular piece at

the end of that block. The old original plat of that block was destroyed in the Chicago fire and subsequent plans failed to show the strip along the railroad at all. August Hackbarth, who owns the lot next to Mr. Lindner and who was a member of the village board at the time of the granting of the franchise to the P. L. Z. & W. Ry. says that the strip of land back of those lots is village property and that an old abstract of his showed an oblong lot along the railroad which present plats fail to show. The village board entered into quite a discussion in which Attorney Humphrey joined and an effort will be made to find out just who owns the "lost" property. Meanwhile Mr. Lindner was advised to go ahead with his building the foundation of which is already in, and if it turns out that the village does own the property, he will have to make some deal with the village and if the descendants or the "ghost" of the old P. L. Z. & W. Ry. own it, he will be all set with a five year lease.

Cow Destroyed After Owner Is Attacked

A cow, owned by Adolf Boyson of Graytown, was shot by deputy sheriffs of Lake county last Wednesday upon the request of the owner after the animal had attacked him twice and finally escaped from his farm. The cow was one of a herd Boyson was pasturing on the Casey farm on route 172. His first trouble occurred with it a week ago Tuesday when he was taking the herd from pasture. He had led from the rest of the lot but one of them was unusually wild and refused to be driven. When he finally managed to corner it, the animal charged him, knocking him down twice, after which it escaped into nearby timber. Fearing the animal was subject to a malady or disease and liable to endanger other animals or persons, he called the sheriff's office to destroy the cow. The deputies were unable to locate the cow Tuesday but finally cornered it on a farm nearby and killed it Wednesday.

Suburban Building Record Month Gro Places November in

A \$3,000,000 month in November placed new suburban building in the Chicago region 31 per cent over October and 176 per cent ahead of November a year ago. The figures are \$3,006,949 November, \$2,301,638 for October, and \$1,089,369 for November, 1935.

This is the third \$3,000,000 month in 1936, the others having been April and July. Prior to last year a record had recorded only 000,000 month since July 1931. The chief source of this increase in new building are easily discoverable. They are found permits issued in 54 communities for 178 new homes to cost \$1,393,544, home alterations, additions for \$203,419 and an usual volume of industrial construction inaugurated amount to \$229,650.

Barrington contributed to record with a total of \$125,000, which was considerable in view of October and in November 1935 when no permits were issued. 7 new homes and 20 remodeling permits was the work listed.
