Wheeling Township Placed Under State Rabies Quarantine

The department of agriculture
of the state of Illinois has ordered
a strict quarantine on dogs in
Wheeling township due to a sudden
outburst of rabies. Seven
cases were reported with a cow
and horse being bitten.
State officers from the depart-
ment have been in the territory
and are demanding a strict quar-
antine. All town people and farm-
ers were urged to cooperate in
seeing that dogs are not allowed
to run at large. The outbreak is
particularly dangerous to owners
of cattle.
A property owner has a right
under the law to shoot any dog
found running loose upon his
property.

Supervisor Grand of Wheeling
township sent a notice to all farm-
ers in the township to be on

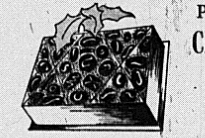

250,000 in voucher payments.

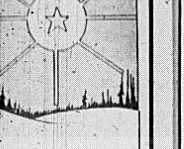

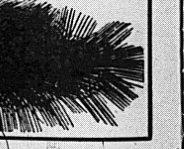
