

C. Oimen Captures Class A Title at Norge Meet Sunday

Twenty Thousand Witnesses at Fox River Grove

Chaper Oimen, member of the United States 1936 Olympic ski team, won the first annual meet of the Norge Ski Club at Fox River Grove Sunday in the closest competition ever witnessed in years. He made two perfect jumps of 144 and 148 feet for a point total of 147.35 to beat George Katschak, national champion, who won the title last year at Red Wing, Minn., with a point average of 145.05.

Approximately 20,000 spectators gathered at the slide along the Fox River to witness the meet. Because of the close standing of the first and second place contestants, judges could not announce the winners until four hours after the meet was over.

Katschak, who was making his first appearance in a Chicago district slide, leaped 177 feet on his first jump and went 167 feet on his second.

A split on the first attempt when he leaped 175 feet, the longest jump of the afternoon, cost California Banton of Central, Wis., former physical education instructor at Morton high school, Chicago, the championship. Banton, a member of the 1936 United States Olympic team, went 176 feet in his second try and wound up in third place with a point score of 144.65.

Close behind Banton was Earl Rogers, former professional champion, who was reinstated by the National Amateur Ski association in 1935, finished in fourth place with jumps of 148 and 171 feet and a point standing of 144.10.

The snow, imported from Scandinavia, built, at a cost of \$1500 and packed three feet deep on the long slide and hill, softened in the spring temperature and provided any chances of the skiers approaching Rogers' record mark. There were frequent splits in the four classes on the program.

Wisconsin, suffered a slight concussion of the brain. Competing in the class A division, Bionline, who scored 231 feet in an exhibition leap on the Norge slide last year, lambed after landing on the 144 foot mark.

Leonard Siler, St. Paul, Minn., won the class B title, leaping 145 and 145 feet. Aron Larson, Rockford, Ill., finished second with jumps of 141 and 131, while a fellow townswan, Louis Vale, took third place by scoring 138 and 142 feet.

The class C championship went to Roy Bionline, brother of Paul, who went 141 and 150 feet. Creighton Bling also of Independence, Mo., and Mattie only tried in the division, which is opened to boys under 18 years old. Jorgen Johanson, Rockford, Ill., veteran jumper, scored the entire division with jumps of 135 and 142 feet.

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
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


