1936 Banner Year in Building for Suburban Region

New Home Construction Vital
Factor of Increase in
Metropolitan Area

A year ago surveys indicated that it building continued to increase as it had in 1935, suburban building in the Chicago region in 1935 would exceed that of 1934. This prediction has come true—the total for the last 12 months was \$27,164,154, that of 1934 was \$25,767,235. The 1935 total exceeds the combined totals of 1932, 1933, and 1934, which amounted to \$25,048,415. It is also 18 per cent greater than the 1935 total of \$1,675,318.

The month of December 1934 shows gain over the same month of 1935 of 78 per cent. The figures for 1934 and 1935 are as follows: December, 1934, \$2,164,949; December, 1935, \$3,881,000. This represents a monthly increase of 78 per cent.

It may be of interest to recall that the bottom of the depression was struck by suburban building in March 1933 when the permits issued in the Chicago region amounted to only \$198,224. Two years followed in which the totals were less than a half million dollars. But in March 1935 the upturn was very definite, with monthly totals ranging from \$1,000,000 to nearly \$2,000,000. This continued until the months of January and February of 1936, when the extremely cold weather made building practically impossible. With March 1934 a powerful low home building record, and the figures began to rise to double and triple those of 1933.

Building activity in Barrington for the year of 1934 climbed to the highest peak reached since 1931 with a volume more than 100 per cent greater than the total of either 1934 or 1935. The total for 1934 was \$11,812. No permit was issued in December by Herman Garbisch, building contractor. This year's figures exceed the combined totals of the last three years.

The importance to the building industry of the Chicago suburban region is strikingly demonstrated by the fact that building permits in the city of Chicago were issued in 1934 for \$18,939,232, which compares with the \$27,164,154 for the surrounding territory. In 1935 the comparison was \$12,000,000.

ST-DOWN STRIKES AND LAW

Although less than a year has elapsed since many French strikers, instead of walking out, took possession of plants by sitting idle at their machines, this technique of labor warfare has already become almost standard procedure in America in certain classes of disputes.

Negotiations in the strike against the General Motors corporation, arranged for the abatement of the strike, broke down on the question of continuing such a strike and over the reasons alleged for its continuance.

Effectiveness of this procedure is confined chiefly to mass production industries in which processes are so integrated that a stoppage at one point slows down or stops the entire productive process. Rubber, glass, automobiles and related industries are the most vulnerable.

From the standpoint of employers, no effective defense has yet been devised. At Flint, Mich., an injunction was obtained by the General Motors corporation for the removal of strikers from a Fisher Body plant, but the sheriff, declaring his forces insufficient for making it effective, left the matter rest there.

This incident points to a new chapter in labor litigation on a subject with which the courts have not yet had occasion to deal. But without the benefit of prior decisions in similar cases, the courts would be compelled to resort to precedents arising out of somewhat analogous situations.

The chief weapons of the laborer are the strike, henceforth have been the strike, without the sit-down element; the picket and the boycott.

The most important legal difference between the sit-down strike and these other weapons is that the sit-down strike is based on the possession of the plant, and the right to the possession of property are firmly entrenched in the Anglo-American legal system.—United States News.
