School Has Second Building Project Approved by WPA

Cost Estimated at \$22,395;
New Wing Interior
to Be Finished

A second government project for

this community to be approved

was reported Saturday. Last week

the project for landscaping

school grounds was

approved and this week, according

to the school board, a second job to finish the

interior of the new wing was ap-

proved.

The job is estimated to cost

\$22,395 with \$4,663 being ap-

plied from the government.

The project, which would be

done by the school board, is

estimated to be necessary due to

the necessary use of skilled

labor and cost of materials with

the WPA.

The project calls for the

construction of partitions for class-

rooms, laying of maple floors, and

painting, plastering and lath-

ing. The interior of the new wing

will be done by contract. Mr. Smith

is the architect.

There are 19 men employed on

the project at present, including

the architect.

The project for landscaping

school grounds was estimated at

\$16,130 while the government fur-

thered about 65 per cent of the

cost.

1936 Banner Year in Building for Suburban Region

New Home Construction Vital Factor of Increase in Metropolitan Area

A year ago figures indicated that if building continued to increase as it had in 1935, suburban building in the Chicago region in 1936 would exceed that of 1931. The prediction was correct, the total for the last 12 months was \$17,915,154, that for 1931 was \$9,767,258.

The latest available figures for 1935, 1934 and 1933 which amount to \$17,915,154, is the 50 per cent greater than the 1932 total of \$11,915,154.

The month of December 1935 showed a 10 per cent increase in the total of \$17,915,154, that for 1931 was \$9,767,258.

It may be of interest to recall that the bottom of the depression was struck by the building industry in May 1933, when the total issued in the Chicago region amounted to only \$198,324. Two years later the total was \$11,915,154, or exceeded a half million dollars. But in March 1935 the upturn was very sharp, the total monthly monthly total ranging from \$1,000,000 to nearly \$2,000,000.
