Falling Phobia of Waukegan Man Gives Engineers Jitters

John Golman, 45 years old, 140 North La Salle, Waukegan, has a phobia for falling in front of trains and viewing them from the immediate vicinity. He has been run over by the locomotive, tender, baggage car and one engine of a Chicago and North Western train at Waukegan Thursday night. The same thing happened a week ago Monday about the same place, near a railroad cemetery at Waukegan. Golman was not hurt nor were his clothes torn when the train passed over him as he lay between the rails. But there's a fear of a rock or something else caused him to stumble on the tracks. The trains approached both nights. Golman told police and railway investigators Friday at the Waukegan jail. And, believe it or not, a fellow can't be falling from a train twice every week without crying something. Golman was following the path up through the cemetery and across the tracks as was his custom when returning home after a friendly chat and a few drinks with a friend at the night, he explained after he was released Thursday night.

Fred Freeman, 3250 Augusta boulevard, Chicago, engineer of the train which ran over Golman Thursday night, was not calm about the whole affair. He said, "It appeared to him that the man walked up on the tracks from the east side and lay down as the train approached from the north two car lengths away. But Golman insisted he didn't intend to be run over."

"If I wanted to be hurt worst I knowed when the train passed over" I parried Golman. Now he is in Chicago. He formerly worked at the American steel and wire company. His wife and child are living in Chicago.

Two police cars and ambulance rushed to the scene after Freeman notified the department that his train had run over a man. After ascertaining that Golman was not injured, Officers Bob Tyrrell, Roy Edwards and Ben Tracy took him to the police station.

Last night's officers Edwards and Ernest Spearman took Golman to the hospital for examination after he was a switch crew he had been run over by a train. He was released that time after it was found he had suffered no injuries.

Circulation records for the Barrington public library were broken during the month of January when 25,000 books were taken out by patrons. Miss Olive Dobson, librarian reported. There was a month-

ly sale of 570 books and a gain of 588 over the same month last year. The previous high record was in February of 1935. A year ago, in January, the library was closed to add an extra day of service, making four days each week in which patrons might have use of the library. The extra day was held on Monday. The others are Monday, Wednesday and Saturday.

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Hold Men to Grand Jury in Still Raid

Max Goldman of Chicago and Mike Ronadone, of Elgin, were bound over to the federal grand jury Tuesday afternoon at a hearing before U. S. Commissioner Edwin K. Walker in Chicago.

The men were apprehended by agents of the U. S. division of internal revenue on the night of January 15 when a 20,000 gallon still was confiscated in the Tri-angel garage building at Douglas and Center avenues in Elgin. Goldman at that time was proprietor of the Tri-angel garage, which occupies the basement and first floor of the building.


