## Tells Club Women Ways to Develop Mental Resources

Mrs. Van Buren Speaker;  
N. Leighton Sings

In discussing "Meeting Our Best Years" at the February meeting of the Barrington Woman's club, held in the Methodist church Wednesday afternoon, Mrs. John Van Buren, a nationally known lecturer, quoted salient points in modern books suggesting ways for a modern woman to use her resources for a rich maturity.

About 120 women attended the meeting.

"Motherhood isn't a life lesson," she said. "It is a way of life. Every mother should have her child to get along without her and her mother should be able to get along without her child. If we use our time well in the early decades, we should have no fear when we are old."

"Successful people are the leaders. The most majority are not leaders, but they have done their own individuality in this age of mass production. The secret of flexibility, a surrender to habit that is characteristic of middle age, is to be able to do what the need is gone and we could be using our time for more interest, instead of less."

Her suggestions for mental resources were as follows: organize the will to learn; give your mind a chance to grow; make a collection of serials, rather an astringent such as memorizing a poem; a walk in the woods; a hobby; and as the fostering of an ability to add light touches to a conversation.

Her necessary uplifts in times of depression should be based on good health, a sense of humor and "plus gestures." "We need to live well, live healthily, live and live dangerously at times," Mrs. Van Buren said, adding "we should be able to use our maturity can enjoy the fulfillment of the years. The art of self-improvement is most important."

## G. Atkins Found Guilty on Charge of Manslaughter

George Atkins, 214 E. Main street, was found guilty on a manslaughter charge by a jury in Cook County Court at Chicago Tuesday. A motion for a new trial was denied by Justice F. J. D. Judge Ralph H. Scott. A manslaughter charge was filed against Atkins for his 1934 summer imprisonment or probation.

The charge was brought following an auto accident in which Atkins occurred near Elgin October 27, and which resulted in the death of Alvin L. Mrs. Stark, a 21-year-old Mrs. Stark, a bride of four days, at the time of the accident, told the court she was as dead as she could be.

Mr. Atkins, accused by his mother, Mrs. Emma Atkins, was returning from a vacation at his farm near Dayton, O., when according to witnesses, he had a sharp turn on a two-lane highway and collided with the car driven by Stark.
