Reviews Biographies Members and guests of the literature department of this club, at a meeting in the public library Tuesday afternoon of this week, heard a summary of worthwhile biographies published during the past year in addition to an excellent review of Kipling's autobiography, "Something of Myself to My Friends Known and Unknown," presented by Miss Elsie Wyzant, director of Country Day school.

"Holding up a mirror to actual life is wholesome and especially comforting to adolescents," said Miss Wyzant who then went on to tell how the modern attitude toward biography has changed so much during recent years that it is almost a different type of writing now.

Among the books Miss Wyzant recommended as being of particular value to children were "Invincible Louise," "Romantic Rebel," "Life of Craig," "How to Write," "The Life of Elizabeth Frye."

Adults enjoy a variety of biographies, she said; some are of substance characters in the setting, giving a vivid picture of the

times; others are dramatic; each includes a great deal of research. All help the reader to share experiences in other people's lives. Those biographies which Miss Wyzant endorsed for adults as typical of the modern illuminating type of writing included "Footlights and Spotlights," "An American Idol," "Margaret, Olivia," "B. Searville Pratt," "Joan of Arc," "Add Gladly I Teach," "Barralet of Wimpole Street," "Victoria Regina" and the strikingly different studies of Victoria penned by Lytton Strake and Edith Sitwell.

In outlining Kipling's autobiography, written at the age of 70 but not published until after his death, Miss Wyzant read many revealing passages, each indicating the simplicity and modesty of the writer. Kipling constantly stressed the fact that his books wrote themselves, she said. His advice to other writers was "when your demon is in charge do not try to consciously; wait, drift, obey."
