Government in its best sense is the art of adjustment of the majorities and minorities in an organized society. The constitution of the United States is the finest document ded by the mind of man to adjust minority and majority

Disregard of minorities in other countries and in our own has produced revolutions and bloodshed throughout world history. Failure of statesmanship to adjust the minority and majority viewpoints in America gave us tragic war between the states in 1861 after 40 years of debate.

the states in 1861 after 40 years of debate. Today we have a conflict of view which goes to the root of constitutional government itself. About 16,000,000 persons voted in the last election for a candidate and a party they believed would preserve and defend the constitution against subversion or attrition. The candidate who as triumphant, however, had avoided discussing the constitutional issue at all. He left it to be interred that he did not plan any assault the American constitutional system as we have 150 years.

The American people for 150 years have been governed under a compact of specific and anumerated powers. This compact provides checks and balances against abuse of power by any one of the three departments of government.

There were dozens of issues in the campaign of 1936 in-cluding primarily the proud boast of the administration that thad spent billions of dollars to achieve recovery. There was no suggestion then of a grave crisis ahead. Nor, since the election last November, have any constitutional questions en decided adversely to the new deal by the supreme court. Yet Mr. Roosevelt in his last two radio speeches used the word "crisis" and the word "now" several times as justi-fication for his assumption that the executive and congress had been given a people's mandate to invade the judicial branch of the government.—The United States News.
