## Gain in Revenue of Cook County Taxes Seen by Assessor

Assessor John S. Clark Tuesday saw the fruits of victory in his two year fight for access to federal income tax returns of Cook county.

Millions of dollars invested in stocks, bonds, mortgages, and other intangible securities were today opened for inspection to the assessor through the Illinois State Tax commission, of which Professor Simpson Leland is chairman.

and through Carter H. Harrison, collector of internal revenue.

Assessor Clark stated, "This does not mean more taxes for the city and county to spend—it will result in lower taxes for real estate, business concerns, and manufacturing establishments who are now paying the other fellow's share, in addition to their own." "These returns" he continued, "contain the information for the first time in Cook county as to whom the other fellow is."

The assessor said there was nothing unfair about the taxation of this heretofore hidden wealth, because it has paid no local taxes whatever. Illinois being one of the states which have no income tax law.

He further stated that the taxes to be levied would not be too burdensome for the reason that he would assess the property at 35 per cent of its reported value, which would result in a tax comparable to income taxes of other states.

## Pass Resolution Changing Walks on Main Street

### Take Action on Petition to Make Alterations for Owners' Benefit

Village trustees agreed a resolution approving a petition signed by 41 property owners asking the main street requesting change in the proposed widening of Main street at the meeting Monday evening. The petition was circulated by D. A. Louis E. Schacher, chairman of the street committee, and asked that the Cook county board make additional change to assist residents living along the street.

It requested that all sidewalks be moved back from the street to be brought to grade with the road and that trees or shrubs damaged by moving the walks be replaced by the commissioners. When it was learned that the sidewalk west of Dundas avenue to the south side of Main street would be with those living on the street to assist for having all walks lowered where necessary, and also the drive and approach to drive back in order to permit easy access and across for their cars.

The petition also requested the extension of the project in the west village limits. The work is now planned to be finished about 95 feet west of Hager avenue.

According to reports, danger signs will be placed at the Hart road this week, sending traffic over to Highway 124, and into the village. This will be done by the contractor when he begins work at the west end.
