Two persons were drowned in Lake county lakes over the weekend and a drowning was reported near Byron's Bridge in Fox river near McHenry county. Seven persons narrowly escaped death when two boats were swept over the dam in the Fox river at St. Charles.

Dr. J. Donovan Bohr, 33 years old, a dentist attached to the Illinois state hospital for the insane at Dunning, was drowned at Bangs Lake in Waukegan Sunday afternoon. At the time of the accident he was out in a motor boat with several young boys.

According to reports, the boat tipped over when a short turn was attempted. Dr. Bohr was credited with rescuing the youths before going down himself. His body was recovered an hour later.

Surviving are his wife, sister and father, John Bohr of Waukegan. The dead man was a classmate of Dr. Floyd Lindberg of Barrington at dental college.

Cook County Tax Bills Will Show Increase for 1936

**Barrington Town Basic Rate
Is \$1.47; Over 1935
by 35 Cents**

Bills for the 1936 taxes on Cook county showing a general increase in rates will be mailed out to property owners in Barrington within the next ten days, Mrs. Pearl Adams, collector, reported this week. Real estate bills are payable in two installments but personal property taxes are payable in one installment only.

The office of the collector will be located at Brewer Motor Sales, 203 S. Cook street, beginning July 1. The hours are from 9 a. m. to 12 noon and from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m. daily, except Sunday. Saturday evenings the office will be open from 6 to 8.

The basic rate for the town of Barrington, forest preserve, town, port relief and road and bridge, is \$1.47. The rate for the village of Barrington is \$1.05, and for the park district \$1.25. The rate for the village of Barrington is \$1.05, and for the park district \$1.25.

The increase in tax rates this year is \$1.935 and previously by taxing bodies and by the reduction in assessed valuation on property.

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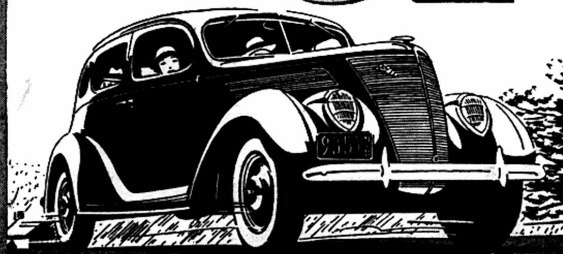

portment and the foundation of an equalization board for the more even spread of assessment. He compared this present set-up in Cook county with methods formerly used.

The Countryside Property Owners' association, he stated, was in a position to render service in assisting in finding true property values for assessment.

Both men stressed the fact that 70 percent of tax money is spent locally, and suggested that those present become better acquainted with officers of local taxing districts to learn how funds are used.

A resolution was adopted suggesting that route 55 be recommended for permanent location through the village at its western end, between Dundas avenue and the limits, but not in the country. A committee of five is to be appointed to meet with the Barrington park commissioners and other interested persons to learn public opinion.

The committee will also investigate the proposed re-routing of highway 60 (Rand road) around Lake Zurich. The committee expects to contact the newly organized Lake Zurich Community Boosters' club in regard to that situation.

Committees will also be appointed by V. D. Hawley, supervisor of the town of Barrington, and Harry Washo, supervisor of the town of Elia, to meet with a committee already appointed by the town of Cuba for the purpose of examining and placing signs on the three township roads.

H. D. Kelsey, supervisor of the town of Cuba, Mr. Hecht and Mr. Washo were present at the meeting, and as well as discussing roads, spoke on the operation of their respective townships.

Park commissioners, village officers and township officials were present at the meeting.

In addition to the committee for the two routes, one will also be appointed to zone property where signed contracts of agreement are in effect. This will operate in conjunction with the present zoning committee headed by F. L. Bateman.

Chairmen from last year for the following standing committees were re-appointed by Mr. Hecht. They are as follows:

H. C. Cheney, admissions; George F. Harding, roads; Malcolm Shroyer, education; Fred A. Poole, roadside beautification; Dr. Paul B. Magnuson, conservation and wildlife; F. L. Bateman, zoning; George O. Fairweather, civic affairs; Frank A. Hecht, tax; O. S. Caeoer, transportation; Paul W. Trifer, police and fire protection; W. P. Sider, legal and legislative.

PROGRESS

Competition, the right of an individual to get ahead in the world on his own merits, has been the keystone of progress in the New World. Any man who had an idea, and the ability and initiative, could go into business for himself. And so far, he still retains that privilege.

Unfortunately, that is not true of the rest of the world. Some recent statements by the commerce department in Washington show the contrast. These are the stories they tell:

1. For many years, interior towns in the South American nation of Colombia have offered a sizeable market for United States fruits. But because of the distance, there was no way of reaching the market. Now, however, the answer has been found. American fruits are shipped to Puerto Colombia in refrigerated steamers. There they are put aboard airplanes and carried in a few minutes to interior ports which it used to take days to reach with mule trains.

2. Years ago, deposits of radium were discovered at La Bine Point, Canada—in the Arctic region—1500 miles from the nearest railroad. The distance from transportation made it impossible to work the mine. Now, airplanes again are being used to carry materials, supplies and radium the 1500 miles so it may be used to help ailing mankind.

3. In Estonia, the minister of economic affairs has deferred for seven months a decision on whether to permit establishment of a new glass factory.

There's the contrast: In the New World, men with ideas have succeeded in flying health-giving fruits and health-restoring radium to their fellow men. In the Old World, a man with an idea that he can produce glass more cheaply for his fellow men is going to have to sit idle seven months while the government "investigates."

NEED STOP LIGHTS

With part of the bend taken out of Hough street at the Main street crossing, a natural speed retarder for vehicles has been removed. To make the crossing safer rather than less safe, "Stop and Go" lights should be installed. Tourists approaching on Hough do not know that Main is a stop street. The addition of route 59 to Hough will increase the number of tourists.

"In the regulations which congress may prescribe respecting the custody of the public moneys, it is desirable that as little discretion as may be deemed consistent with their safe keeping should be given to executive agents. No one can be more deeply impressed than I am with the soundness of the doctrine which restrains and limits, by specific provisions, executive discretion, as far as it can be done consistently with the preservation of its constitutional character. In respect to the control over the public money this doctrine is particularly applicable."—Andrew Jackson.

Distribute \$992 to County Schools for Student Aid Program

Nearly \$2,000,000 was spent in Illinois by the national youth administration in its student aid program during the school year just closed, permitting some 25,000 young men and girls to continue their education in high schools and colleges, according to a report issued today by William J. Campbell, state NYA director.

In Lake county, 154 students were provided with part-time work after class hours for which the national youth administration expended a total of \$992.30, the figures just released showed.

High school students received a maximum of \$4 monthly with which to take care of such necessary expenses as carfare, lunches and other incidentals. The average for undergraduate college students was \$15 per month and graduate students \$25 per month.

Student work consists of such socially desirable tasks as marking papers, assisting teachers, tabulation of laboratory specimens, scientific research work and other tasks which do not displace full-time workers. Bears Play Arlington in District Quarter-Finals at Elgin Tonight

5 Teams Remain in Race; Take 9-7 Contest Monday

Winner of Tonight's Contest Plays Friday Night in Semi-Finals

Spotting the Sycamore Anacardias five runs in the first two innings, the Barrington Bears came back and won the game 9 to 7 Monday night in the district tournament at Elgin for the right to enter the quarter-finals. Winner of the district meet will play for the state title at Elgin during July.

The Bears must win two hard ball games to earn the right to play the Elgin West Ends for the championship Sunday afternoon. The team at present is well-balanced, and has a number of good hitters. Prospects for winning the title are excellent.

Arlington Heights will be the toughest of the two opponents and the game tonight should be a scrappy battle. A large number of local fans have been making the trip to Elgin to follow the team, and interest in tonight's game is high.

Demonstrate Farm Terracing Friday

A demonstration of terrace building as a part of the soil conservation program will be held at the Corlies Anderson farm, north of route 53, Golf road, four miles east of Elgin, on Friday afternoon at 2:30. The program has been arranged by O. G. Barrett, Cook county farm adviser.

Ralph C. Hay, an extension specialist of the University of Illinois, will assist in conducting the demonstration. Friday, Mr. Barrett, in outlining the demonstration, said: "Terraces properly built are good insurance not only against further heavy losses of soil but also for the successful start of a lime and

legume program. They minimize the danger of having expensive fertilizers and seed washed away by heavy rains. Terracing is not a substitute for good soil conservation practice; it supplements soil conservation measures by providing for protection."


Post Office Ceases to Issue S.S. Cards

15 cents, road and bridge 35 cents, or an increase in the 1936 basic of 25 cents. This increase in part can be explained by the addition of 50 cents for poor relief, a new

item of expense last year. Other comparisons show the village rate increased six cents, the park rate 20 cents and school district No. 4 8 cents. The only reduction in the basic rate was made by the town of Barrington when 3 cents was cut from the general corporate tax fund.
