Death of Former Resident in Riot Held Justifiable

Coroner's Jury Gives Verdie in Fatal Shooting of A. Tagliere, 28

The death of Anthony Tagliere The death of Anthony Tagliere, 28-year-old former resident of Barrington, who died June 1 of gunshot wounds received in the Memorial Day riot at the South Chicago mill of the Republic Steel Chicago mill of the Republic Steel corporation, was determined Tuesday as justifiable homicide by a coroner's jury that had taken testimony on Tagliere's death and those of six others for the past week. The jury's verdict covered all seven deaths.

The deceased is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Tagliere, 515 E. 74th street, Chicago, and had lived here with his parents for more than 10 years. While here the family used the name of Taylor. They moved from this vicinity last fall.
