

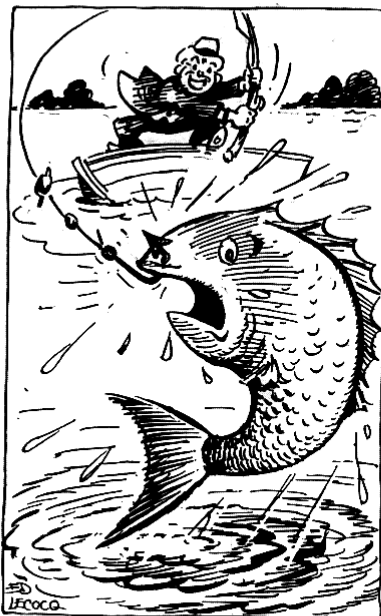
Review One of Three Illinois Newspapers to Win NEA Awards

McMillen Meets Chief O. Sanooko at Round Lake Arena Friday

One of the greatest wrestling cards ever presented in Peg's Round Lake Arena will be staged Friday night and will feature a match to the finish between "Big" Jim McMillen, leading contender for the world's mat championship, and Chief O. Sanooko, champion of the summer and Chief O. Sanooko, giant 330 pound Indian strongman. Lake county mat fans have been promised an outstanding card by local promoters who missed a part of last Friday's program when they left early because of rain.
The Sanooko-McMillen encounter is a rematch of a meeting several weeks ago between the pair in White City arena, Chicago. In this match Sanooko pinned McMillen for the first time since the referee lay helpless outside of the ring, and by the time he had returned to officiate McMillen had broken away and put down the Indian star. Sanooko agreed to drop a formal protest up with the state athletic commission if McMillen would meet him again to settle the score and the match was closed.

Two Men Drown in Lakes at Wauconda

The high waves Sunday were believed to have released the body from the lake, sending it to the surface where it was found floating.
Frants was drowned at Slocum lake Sunday when he fell out of his rented motorboat and struck his head against the outboard motor attached to it. He was the season's sixteenth drowning in Lake county. During the 1936 season, only 15 were drowned.
A short while after the accident his body was found floating on the water about 100 yards from shore. At the inquest conducted by Coroner John L. Taylor, it was determined death occurred by drowning.
Frants and his wife had been frequent visitors at the Welch beach. They had come out Sunday for their Chicago home for a day's outing. While his wife remained on shore, he had rented a boat with an outboard motor attached.
Bodies of both drowning victims were removed to Chicago for burial services.

Probate Will of A. Dahms of Palatine

The will of the late Albert H. Dahms of Palatine, who died in Elgin June 25, was admitted to probate in the Cook county probate court last week. It disposed of an estate estimated at \$5000 in personal property and \$5000 in real estate.
After paying debts, the will directs the balance of the estate be given to his nephew, Harvey Dahms of Wauconda. William F. Testimier of Palatine was appointed executor.
