Charges for Sewer **Connections Passed**

Sewer connection charges were established Monday night by the adoption of an amended ordinance setting forth the rates for two classifications of connections. The measure was approved following a motion made by Trustee John J. Carroll.

A fee of \$8 is fixed for property not now connected to any municipal storm or sanitary sewer

A fee of \$5 is fixed for property not now connected to any municipal storm or sanitary sewillne, and which has previously been charged for sewers under special assessment or some other method. In brief, the \$5 charge applies where sewers have caised but the property has not been conditionable to the property has not been connection charge to property not now connected to any sewer line, and which has not paid for a sewer previously. This woud cover any subdivision or section of town where sewers have not been laid. Under the amended ordinance, application for a permit to connect to the sewers must be made to the village clerk. "Failure to escure the proper permit will subject the offender to a fine or not less than \$10 or more than \$200.
