Burglars Steal Two Typewriters at Ela High in Week-End

Two brand new typewriters were stolen from the Ela township high school at Lake Zurich some time over the week-end by prowlers who broke a window in a door at the rear of the gymnasium to gain entrance.

A third machine was found in the girls' washroom where it had apparently been abandoned by the burglars, who were believed to have been frightened away. The loss was discovered Monday morning when janitors were inspecting the building and found a typewriter ribbon stretched across the gymnasium floor. The ribbon was apparently dropped in flight and survived.

The two machines were from a shipment of six just purchased for the school commercial classes. Nothing else in the building was disturbed.

According to reports, persons were seen in the vicinity of the school grounds Sunday afternoon.

J. L. Clements, principal of Ela township high school, stated that a woman wire fence would be requested for the grounds to protect the building from any future similar cases.

St. Anne Parochial School Will Open Wednesday, Sept. 8

Pupils returning to St. Anne parochial school in Barrington on opening day, Wednesday, Sept. 8, will find additional classroom space provided with new equipment. The building has been completely redecorated inside.

The original plans called for opening of school one day earlier but the Chicago Catholic school board notified Father P. J. Hayes, pastor of St. Anne, that the date was officially September 8.

Sister M. Dulcetta is Mother Superior and principal of the school. She will be assisted by Sister M. Malchy, Sister Marion Sister M. Clement is procurator.

Sister M. Dulcetta is in charge of the school and instruction will be given outside of regular class. This also includes class and individual instruction in vocal and instrumental music.

Anticipate Student Gain at Ela School

Registration days at Ela township high school in Lake Zurich will reveal an increase in this year's number of students compared to other years, J. L. Clements, principal of the school, estimated Tuesday.

The school opens Tuesday, Sept. 7, and final preparations have been made to receive the incoming pupils. The Lake Zurich grammar school also opens September 7.

Fall Enrollment in High School Opens Tuesday Afternoon

Release Time Schedules; Will Start Lower Grades on September 13

Pupils in the senior high school of the Barrington public school, which includes the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades, are expected to report to the high school assembly some time Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 7, or Wednesday, Sept. 8, according to the time schedule given below. Junior high school pupils and those in the lower grades will not report until Monday, Sept. 13, because of the alterations in that part of the school building. Senior high students will receive their textbooks when they report, padlocks, lockers and seats will be assigned, and pupil schedules distributed. It is expected that any conflicts in individual programs will be ironed out Wednesday so that regular classes can commence Thursday morning without confusion.

The fee for the senior high school pupils is five dollars (\$5). This fee covers the rental of all textbooks, workbooks, padlocks, lockers, and ordinary school supplies with the exception of pens, pencils, and gym suits. Student activities tickets will be issued at the same time. These tickets will admit pupils to all athletic contests, the three regular school plays, the six Northwest Assemblies programs, and will also cover a year's subscription to the school paper, the Broncho. The advisability of such a ticket was discussed by the students last spring and almost 95 per cent of them indicated their intention of purchasing one. This cooperation will make it possible for all students to attend all the school functions for approximately \$10 cents an event and at the same time will insure each activity as much money as received formerly.
