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## DO YOU KNOW ILLINOIS?

The secretary of state of Illinois is the state librarian ex-officio. The state library and archives division under his jurisdiction contains information of particular interest to readers and of which are not covered in this series will be answered immediately. Address all communications: Edward J. Hughes, Secretary of State, Public Information Department, Capital, Springfield, Illinois.

**Q. When was the civilian conservation corps established in Illinois?**  
A. In April, 1933. An age limit of 25 years was fixed with a service limit of 18 months.

**Q. How were the counties in Illinois divided in the gubernatorial election last November?**  
A. 66 counties voted Democratic and 34 Republican.

**Q. When was the first complete criminal code adopted in Illinois?**  
A. In 1788, one year after the Northwest Territory was organized.

**Q. What punishment did the early Illinois laws impose upon disobedient children?**  
A. For disobedience on the part of servants or children, imprisonment was provided; for striking a master or parent the penalty was 10 lashes.

**Q. After what lake was Lake county named?**  
A. After Lake Michigan.

**Q. When was the first effort for horse thieves in early Illinois?**  
A. In 1788, one year after the Northwest Territory was organized.

**Q. What was the first enrollment of the University of Illinois?**  
A. When the university opened for classes in 1859 there were only 50 students registered.

**Q. When was the first divorce law passed in the Northwest Territory?**  
A. Passed by Governor and Judges, July 15, 1795. At that time the legislature reserved to itself the right to grant absolute divorce.

**Q. Where is the stream that was called "the little river above Fort Massac"?**  
A. The stream that is now called Massac Creek, flowing into the Ohio, immediately east of the city of Metropolis, Massac county.

**Q. When was the average system of the city of Chicago established?**  
A. 1855. Chicago's population for that year was about 65,000.

Sales for the first 32 weeks of 1937 were \$14,959,583.51 as compared with \$12,242,464.88 for a like period in 1936, an increase of 14.92 per cent.
