National Census on Unemployment to Start Tuesday
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working in CCC camps, (e) persons employed on NYA projects, (d) persons receiving NYA student aid, and (e) persons working on emergency work projects conducted by state or local governments as part of a work relief program.

Instructions for filling out the cards to be delivered to the homes Tuesday were announced by the post department through L. B. Paddock, Barrington postmaster, this week. If sufficient cards are not available, additional ones may be had from any rural or city carrier or from the post office. When the cards have been filled out, they may be handed to any carrier, placed in a collection box or brought to the post office.

The cards are self-explanatory but if any help is needed, postal employees are instructed to be of assistance to the public.

The following groups of employed persons should not fill out and return unemployment report cards:

(a) Persons who are working full time for wages or commissions or devote full time to their own business, farm or professional practice, even though they may be looking for another job.

(b) Persons who are working part time (except on emergency work projects) and who do not want to work.

(c) Persons temporarily sick or disabled but who have a full time job to which they can return.

(d) Persons who are on vacation or taking time off from a full time job to which they will return. Other groups specifically excluded from registering are (a) persons who are unable to work, (b) persons who have retired or who do not want to work, and (c) young persons excluded from work because of child labor laws.

Unpaid family workers whose work is in the home, the family store, or the family farm, without pay, and who expect to continue in this way should not fill out a card. But if they formerly had a paid job, and are able to work and are looking for a job with pay, or are looking for their first job, they should fill out a card.

Full time students at school or college ordinarily will not fill out cards even though they are seeking incidental employment, but if they are receiving NYA student aid or are looking for full time work and expect to quit school when they find work they should fill out and return cards.

1938 License Blanks Released by State
First shipments of applications for 1938 automobile licenses were shipped for distribution throughout the state last week. The first of these were sent to city and county clerks, sheriffs, notary publics, police stations, newspapers, and motor clubs.

In releasing the applications Secretary of State Edward J. Hughes stressed the necessity of public cooperation in order that issuance of licenses be expedited. Motorists wishing to retain the numbers which were issued them in 1937 must specifically request reassignment prior to Dec. 1, 1937. After this date no numbers are kept back in favor of their present holders.

Secretary Hughes urged that applications be filled out as soon as possible, properly notarized, and sent to the Springfield office accompanied by the fee in the form of a certified check, draft, or money order. Release of the license plates will be made early in December.

Care in filling out the blanks and complying with all necessary regulations, will help both the state automobile division and the motoring public.

One of the features of the 1938 registration cards which will keep an accurate check on violations of the F. W. Lewis law providing penalties for drunken and reckless driving is the form at the back of the card with space for recording the dates of violations, violations charged, and signatures of judges hearing the cases.

"Every motorist must carry this card with him for identification purposes," said Secretary Hughes, "and the fact that it is also a record of his responsibility, or lack of it, as a driver is an element which should make him pause and think, and thinking is what is needed to make motoring safe for all of us."
