State Departments Favor Forest Fire Prevention Plans

"The necessity for care in the prevention of woods and field fires is becoming more important each day. Recent rains have aided in keeping such fires to a minimum, but should any prolonged period of little or no precipitation occur, destructive fires will become more and more frequent in making our fire protection problem very difficult." By this statement Thomas J. Lynch, acting director of the department of conservation, voiced a hope for the utmost cooperating of everyone residing within the state.

The division of forestry, of the department of conservation, is actively attempting to initiate a forest fire protection program in Illinois. Representatives of the division of forestry are engaged in making a preliminary survey of what steps are necessary in the future to adequately prevent fires and suppress any that may occur.

Through the medium of meetings and individual contacts with local land owners, farmers and interested organizations, it is hoped that the start of the 1938 fire season

will find adequate measures in force to protect against the usual fire loss. The division of forestry will organize test fire prevention and suppression groups in several localities as a means of perfecting present tentative plans. Suggestions and requests for information concerning the proposed fire protection program should be sent to Thomas J. Lynch, acting director of the department of conservation, or the division of forestry at Springfield, or the district forester, at Benton.

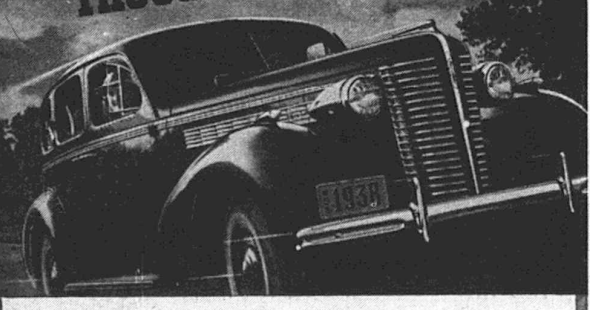

Outlines Use of Land to Be Classed as Non-Depleting

Lake county farmers who are co-operating with the 1938 AAA program are having little difficulty in making good use of land not devoted to soil-depleting crops, according to farm adviser, H. C. Gilkerson.

As a rule they are anxious to use the diverted acres so as to accomplish as much soil improvement and conservation as possible, he explained. They are equally concerned in securing these adjustments and soil-building practices with a minimum of expense and in having them harmonize with the desired program for the farm.

In every case the first step being followed is to take an inventory of the conserving crops there are now found on the farm and that may be utilized in 1938. These may represent biennial and perennial legumes and grasses or catch crops such as sweet clover.

If in addition new seedlings need to be made, alfalfa, clovers or grasses may be seeded alone this spring where the land is not too poor and can be prepared properly. These seedlings may also be made with a nurse crop of small grain if the nurse crop is kept down sufficiently by pasturing to prevent grain formation and if it is not cut for hay.

In the event the land is too sour to grow clovers, and if grasses are not desired, the land may be seeded to soybeans which may be either cut for hay or plowed under as green manure. The land can also be used to Sudan grass or millet and the crop used for pasture or cut for hay.

Acre Allotments for Corn Are Announced

County corn and general depleting crop allotments for Lake and the 101 other counties of the state, all of which are included in the commercial corn area, were established by the state committee by distributing the state acreage allotment among the counties on the basis of the acreage of corn planted during the 10 years 1928 to 1937, inclusive, with credit being given for the acreage diverted in applicable years under agricultural adjustment and conservation programs, and taking into account abnormal weather conditions and trends in acreage.

Lake county allotments have been apportioned to individual Lake county farms by county and township committees on the basis of tillable acreage, crop rotation types of soil and topography. Announcement of the corn acreage allotment and total soil-depleting allotment marks the first step in Lake county in carrying out the 1938 AAA program which aims to establish an ever-normal granary to protect food supplies for consumers and provide more stable and adequate incomes for farmers. Farm Adviser Gilkerson and Faulkner said.

REVIEWPOINTS

Barrington Review: Will you give space in your paper to this protest against a ruthless destruction of wild life on the land where the new ball park is to be built.

In the tall grass of these acres the meadowlarks, bob-o-links, bobwhites, partridge, quail, and pheasant build their nests and raise their young. Each year we eagerly await these harbingers of spring with their beautiful songs and watch the age-old cycle of nest building, hatching of the young and their feeding and training. During unseasonable cold spells we put out a variety of food for the birds and endeavor to keep prowling cats and dogs away during nesting time.

When we saw this field in flames last night it was a major tragedy to us for we knew the birds had been nesting for some time. We thought someone had started a small grass fire and it had gotten beyond control so rain out to help but upon inquiry found that the fire department had started the fire to prepare the ground for the ball park. The fire was set in many places to burn quickly and as I watched the flames advance I saw many of our bird friends rise bewildered and blinded by the flames, smoke and heat, uttering startled cries.

If this action were contemplated by the village, why wasn't the grass burned in the early part of March before nesting time and if it had to be done now why wasn't it done in the daytime when the birds were off their nests and could see to fly?

As I walked over this burned area today, I saw many nests of the meadowlark with charred edges and it was a sad sight to watch these songsters flying over the blackened fields or setting in a low tree searching vainly for their nests.

I have never witnessed such wanton cruelty to our friends the song birds and I am voicing this protest in the hope that bird lovers of Barrington, individually or as organizations will protest effectively against such wanton or thoughtless destruction of our wild life.

Highway Department Announces Official Route Changes Here

Route 12 markers have been replaced by route 14 markers over the Northwest highway.

The changes for Illinois highways were announced this week in the official 1933 Illinois highway map released by the department of public works and buildings, division of highways, at Springfield.

Of interest locally are the new markings of U. S. 14 and U. S. 12. Route 12, which formerly was carried on the Northwest highway, has now been re-routed over old 60 and will run through Lake Zurich and Wauconda. Route 14 has been changed to the Northwest highway.

Following are the remarks contained in the bulletin received from the state department:

"Relocation of U. S. 12 beginning at the junction with Illinois

60 south of Richmond over Illinois 60, U. S. 45, and 95th street to U. S. 41 at avenue L, eliminating all of Illinois 60. This change affords easier alignment, better pavement and avoids congestion in Chicago and is four miles shorter than the old marking.

"Marking of city U. S. 12 from the new junction of U. S. 12 and U. S. 45 over the Northwest highway, Foster avenue, Sheridan road, Lake Shore Drive, Michigan avenue and U. S. 120 to 95th street. This marking accommodates U. S. 12 traffic going to downtown Chicago.

"Relocation of U. S. 14 from the present junction with U. S. 12 and Illinois 51 south over old U. S. 12 to Touhy avenue, east to Caldwell avenue, southeast to Peterson avenue, and east to Illinois 42 at Sheridan road. This relocation of U. S. 14 from east of Crystal Lake to Chicago utilizes better pavement, part of it four lanes, is several miles shorter, and together with the relocation of U. S. 12 eliminates many dangerous turning movements at the old junctions of U. S. 12 and U. S. 14.

Extension of Illinois 59 from U. S. 4 south over new construction to a junction with U. S. 66 south of Wilmington. This gives a marked route around Joliet.
