## Mrs. E. Reko Dies While Giving Aid to Hurt Motorists

Excitement and Exertion Are Said to Cause Fatal Heart Attack

A heart attack brought on during a moment of great excitement and tension proved fatal to Mrs. Estelle Reko, 46 years old, residing on Higgins road in the southwest corner of Barrington township, Saturday evening. The accident occurred after a party of injured Chicago motorists were brought into her home.

According to reports, Mrs. Reko suffered an attack when she entered a room where a 24-year-old woman had been brought a few minutes earlier. Death occurred shortly before medical aid could be given.

Persons injured in the accident were: Miss Elizabeth Hardiman, 20 years old, and Miss Catherine Potter, 26 years old, both of 5701 Kedvale avenue; Carl Rogge, 23 years old, 4553 Wabasha avenue; and Nicholas J. Schmidt, 40 years old, 5246 Mangrove street. Their injuries consisted of contusions, lacerations and shock, and after receiving treatment at an Elgin hospital, they were released.

Miss Hardiman, who was driving, it was reported, lost control of the car and it ran off the road. As she attempted to get it back on the highway, the machine went to the opposite side of the road, side-swiped one tree and crashed into another.

The crash was heard at the Reko residence and members of the family rushed to help the injured woman who they brought into the house for first aid. It was shortly after this that Mrs. Reko collapsed, it was learned.

The case was investigated Sunday by a Cook county coroner's physician.

Mrs. Reko had resided in this vicinity for many years. She and her husband, William A. Reko, were part owners of Beverly Lake resort nearby.

Besides her husband, she is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Clyde Shain of Elgin; two sons, Henry, residing at home, and Alfred, living in Dundee; her father, Fred J. Radloff, of Dundee; two brothers, Harold and Ernest Radloff, of Radloff, and a half-sister, Mrs. Clara Fischer, all of Dundee.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Immanuel Lutheran church in Dundee and burial was in East Dundee cemetery.

## Members of Labor Unions Taken Off WPA School Work

Chicago Officials Send Ten Men Home Wednesday in Sudden Move

Work was partially halted Wednesday morning on the WPA project at the public school when Chicago union officials appeared and ordered skilled union workers off the job. No reason was given for the move. The project was advanced by Henry Thune, project supervisor, for the more. Ten men affiliated with skilled craftsman unions or who were formerly associated with such groups were told to go home.

A similar step was taken in Chicago Tuesday when a number of men were removed from jobs but they were allowed to return back to their positions on Wednesday. The union action has been interpreted as an effort to have all WPA skilled work done by union men.

This is the first time that labor difficulties have arisen on the local school project, which was started several months ago. The first floor interior and part of the first and third floors of the new wing are being finished.

Carpenters, bricklayers and painters were among the men taken off the job here Wednesday. Mr. Thune was of the opinion the men would be allowed to return in several days. In the meantime, work went ahead with common labor doing other things not requiring skilled help.

## \$11,000 Damage From Store Fire Wednesday

Valedictorian Merchandise and Fixtures Ruined; Building Wrecked

Plan Immediate Repair and Re-Opening of Ben Franklin Soon

The worst fire the village of Barrington has experienced in many years broke out in the basement of the Ben Franklin store early Wednesday and spread through the ground floor destroying all of the fixtures and virtually all of the merchandise for a loss of \$7000 and causing damage to the building estimated at \$4000. The origin of the fire has not been determined.

The first floor was gutted, the walls and ceilings badly scorched, and the second floor smudged from smoke. The building, owned by E. C. Groff, housed the Ben Franklin store, the office of Dr. E. A. Wells, and the American Legion club rooms. Insurance was carried on the building and on the stock and fixtures of the store.

E. C. Paxton, postal clerk, discovered smoke seeping from the front of the building at about 5:30 a. m. He and Night Policeman William Behrens called the fire department.

## Delivers Talk on Christian Science at Public School

Judge Frederick C. Hill, C.S.B. of Los Angeles, Gives Talk Here Friday Night

Judge Frederick C. Hill, C.S.B. of Los Angeles, Calif., member of the Board of Lectureship of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., delivered a lecture, "Christian Science, The Law of Life Abundant," at the public school auditorium Friday evening under the auspices of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Barrington.

The lecturer spoke substantially as follows: "About the middle of the nineteenth century human thought was active in endeavoring to break many of the limitations which seemed to be the handicap to material progress. The electric telegraph and the telephone were the immediate results. Earlier in the century it was conceived that a submarine cable might be constructed and two continents connected thereby. In 1864 this became an established fact; Europe and America were linked by the first submarine cable.

**The Discoverer and Founder**  
"In the year 1864 Mary Baker Eddy, a kind, intelligent New England woman, made the discovery of the divine laws of Life, Truth, and Love. She observed that just in proportion as she understood and interpreted the law of man's being to the daily affairs of her human experience her thought was elevated and transformed, and that this transformation was expressed in the enjoyment of a better sense of health, happiness, and contentment.

"Because of her love for humanity she desired to share her discovery, and in 1875 she published her book, 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures.' In 1879 she organized a church, 'a church designed to commemorate the words and works of our Master, which should restate primitive Christianity and its lost element of healing' (Manual, p. 17). In 1908 she established an international daily newspaper which, from the standpoint of clean journalism, is regarded by many as the highest standard in the newspaper world. "Between the age of fifty-four and eighty-seven years Mrs. Eddy gave to the world a great book, a great church, and a great newspaper. I am sure you will readily agree that these major achievements are sufficient evidence to sustain our claim that Mrs. Eddy was a great benefactor to humanity."

"In her textbook, 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures,' she says (p. 268): 'In the material world, thought has brought to light with great rapidity many useful wonders. With like activity have thought's swift pinions been rising towards the realm of the real, to the spiritual cause of those lower things which give impulse to inquiry. Belief in a material basis, from which may be deduced all rationality, is slowly yielding to the idea of a metaphysical basis, looking away from matter to Mind as the cause of every effect.'"

"Referring to her revelation she says (ibid., p. 107): 'In the year 1866, I discovered the Christ Science or divine laws of Life, Truth, and Love, and named my discovery Christian Science.' She had discovered the law which Christ Jesus taught and practiced—the law which he applied in healing disease, the law which gave sight to the blind, the law which loosed the dumb tongue, the law which cleansed the lepers, the law which raised Lazarus and others from the dead. He knew the law of God, but he left no writings nor definite rules with his followers."

"Mrs. Eddy's discovery and her writings have given to mankind a definite system, whereby they may prove in Christian Science the truth of Jesus' saying, 'I am the Way.'"



### Annual Report of Library Prepared By Miss O. Dobson

The annual report for the Barrington public library for the past fiscal year has been compiled by Miss Olive Dobson, librarian. There is a total of 5513 adult books, 1822 children books, or a combined total of 7335 in the library at present.

There were 340 adult and 157 children books, or a total of 497, added to the lists this year. Miss Dobson's report showed. Twenty-four volumes, 10 adult and 14 children, were withdrawn from the circulation. Newspapers and current periodicals received number 29, of which 22 are adults and 7 children.

Registration of borrowers was begun in September of 1937 and at present 776 new cards have been issued. Of these there are 502 adult and 275 children. There are 38 adult and 21 children, or a total of 59 rural borrowers.

Adult fiction circulation during last year amounted to 9730 and adult non-fiction circulation was 4283 books. Children stories circulation was 7110 and children non-fiction circulation was 1451. The total circulation of all books was 22,580 excluding periodicals circulation, which amounted to 799 adult and 293 children.

The new features added to the library, and enumerated by Miss Dobson, included a new ceiling and the room redecorated, indirect lighting installed, additional book shelving, story hour continued during the year, vacation reading club for summer reading interest.

### Auditor Reports on Condition of Banks

Payments were made by five closed state banks in the north-west side of Chicago and suburban towns amounting to \$241,990 and three others are expected soon to return \$79,000 more, according to a report made recently by State Auditor Edward J. Barrett, which covered \$9 out of 137 closed banks in Cook county.

The five banks that made returns in the quarter just ended and the totals for each are: Lincoln Trust and Savings bank, \$140,000; Des Plaines State bank, \$50,000; Elmwood Park State bank, \$26,500; First State Bank of Barrington, \$14,500; and Peoples State Bank of Arlington Heights, \$10,000. Each made a 5 per cent refund.

Following is an analysis of the condition of the closed First State Bank of Barrington:

Total receipts, \$466,590; paid on prior claims, \$130,754; paid depositors, \$171,423, or 60 per cent; costs, receivers, \$1,302; legal, \$12,647; clerical, \$28,955; interest, \$2,804; advanced to protect assets, \$74,412, with \$65,757 refunded; cash, \$17,213. The disbursements last month was the ninth. Future ones may boost the total to 75 or 80 per cent.
