
## Directory Questionnaires Are Being Mailed Out

## Mrs. E. Reko Dies While Giving Aid to Hurt Motorists

Excitement and Exertion Are Said to Cause Fatal Heart Attack

A heart attack brought on during a moment of great excitement and tension proved fatal to Mrs. Estelle Reko, 46 years old, residing on Higgins street in the village of Barrington township, Saturday evening. The accident occurred after a party of injured Chicago motorists were brought into her home.

According to reports, Mrs. Reko suffered the attack when she entered a room where an injured woman had been brought a few minutes earlier. Death revolved shortly before medical aid could be given.

Those injured in the accident were: Miss Elizabeth Hardiman, 20 years old, and Miss Catherine Potier, 20 years old, both of 5701 Kedaville avenue; Carl Rogge, 22 years old, 4853 Wabashia avenue, and Nicholas J. Schmidt, 40 years old, 5246 Mangoe street. Their injuries consisted of contusions, lacerations and shock, and after receiving treatment at an Elgin hospital, the car and it ran off the road. ## Delivers Talk on Christian Science at Public School

Judge Frederick C. Hill, C.S.B. of Los Angeles, Gives Talk Here Friday Night

Judge Frederick C. Hill, C.S.B. of Los Angeles, Calif., member of the Board of Lecture of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., delivered a lecture, "Christian Science, the Law of Life and Abundance," in the public school auditorium Friday evening under the auspices of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Barrington.

The lecturer spoke substantially as follows:

"About the middle of the nineteenth century human thought was active in endeavoring to break many of the limitations which seemed to be the handicap to material progress. The electric telegraph and the telephone were the immediate results. After that came the submarine cable which might be constructed and two continents connected thereby. In 1856 this became an established fact; Europe and America were linked by the first submarine cable."

**The Discoverer and Founder**  
"In the year 1856 Mary Baker Eddy, a kind, intelligent New England woman, made the discovery of the divine laws of Life, Truth, and Love. She observed that just as in proportion as man understood and interpreted the law of man's being to the date after which his human experience her thought was elevated and transformed, and that this transformation was expressed in the enjoyment of a better sense of health, happiness, and contentment."

"Because of her love for humanity she desired to share her discovery, and in 1875 she published her book, 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures.' In 1879 she organized a church, 'a church designed to commemorate the life and works of our Master, which should reinstate primitive Christianity and its lost element of healing' (Manual, p. 17). In 1908 she established an international daily newspaper which, from the standpoint of clean journalism, is regarded by many as the highest standard in the newspaper world.

"Between the age of fifty-four and eighty-seven years Mrs. Eddy gave to the world a great book, a great church, and a great newspaper. I am sure you will readily agree that these major achieve-

ments are sufficient evidence to sustain our claim that Mrs. Eddy was a great benefactor to humanity."

"In her textbook, 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures,' she says (p. 258): 'In the material world, thought has brought to light with great rapidity many uses of the law of life and health. We have thought's swift pinions been rising towards the realm of the real, to the spiritual cause of those lower things which give impulse to inquiry. Belief in a material basis, from which may be deduced all rationality, is slowly yielding to the idea of a metaphysical basis, looking away from matter to Mind as the cause of every effect.'

"Referring to her revelation she says (ibid., p. 197): 'In the year 1856, I discovered the Christian Science or divine law of Life, Truth, and Love, and named my discovery Christian Science.' She had discovered the law which Christ Jesus taught and practiced—the law which he applied in healing disease, the law which gave sight to the blind, the law which loosed the dumb tongue, the law which cleansed the lepers, the law which raised Lazarus and others from the dead. He knew the law of God, but he left no writing nor definite rules with his followers."

"Mrs. Eddy's discovery and her writings have given to mankind a definite system whereby they may prove in Christian Science the truth of Jesus' saying, 'I am the Way.'

**Papyrus Made From Plant**  
Papyrus paper was used extensively in Greco-Roman times and was made of the papyrus plant, which grew in profusion along the Nile.

The annual report for the Barrington public library for the past year has been compiled by Miss O. Dobson, librarian. There is a total of 5513 adult books, 1522 children books, a combined total of 7335 in the library at present.

There were 340 adult and 157 children books, or a total of 497, added to the lists this year. Miss Dobson's report showed. Twenty-four volumes, 10 adult and 14 children, were withdrawn from the circulation. Newspapers and current periodicals received number 29, of which 22 are adults and 7 children.

Registration of borrowers was begun in September of 1937 and at present 776 new cards have been issued. Of these there are 502 adult and 275 children. There are 38 adult and 21 children, or a total of 59 rural borrowers.

The Barrington nine will have a busy holiday weekend. Sunday they travel to Aurora to play the game postponed two weeks ago and on Monday, Decoration Day, they go to Des Plaines.

Paulsen and E. Helton supplied the hitting punch in Sunday's game, each getting two hits and scoring twice. Barrington got off to a good advance in the first half of the first inning and scored four runs. The entire line-up batted during this spurt.

Algonquin scored one run in their half of the first and pushed over five more in a hectic third inning, making the score 6 to 4. Two hits and two walks coupled with an error by Paulsen set the stage for the rally.

Barrington put the game on ice by pushing five runs across the plate in the fifth inning and then picked up three more in the eighth for a total of 12 runs. Algonquin failed to score after the third inning, Heitman giving up two hits during the rest of the game.

Loose fielding played an important part in the game Sunday. Five errors were charged against Barrington and seven against Algonquin. Hoppe started on the mound for Algonquin and pitched for two-thirds last. During that time he was knocked for 10 hits and nine runs scored. He was replaced by Helton, who allowed 10 hits and three runs scored.




