## Non-Citizens Are Dropped From WPA

In compliance with a provision of the emergency relief appropria-tion act of 1937, the Illinois works tion act of 1937, the lilinols works progress administration has dropped 2256 non-citizens from its rolls to date. Of them, 1593, or considerably more than half the total for the state, were released in the Chicago area. WPA State total for the state, were released in the Chicago area. WPA State administrator Charles E. Minerissued instructions that the act be compiled with promptly and completely but that no drastic measures be taken immediately against thomse-workers about whose citizenship status there is reasonable doubt.

While the WPA has, been dropping non-citizens from its payrolis, nevertheless it is maintaining its classes in citizenship to belp unaturalized foreign born persons to become citizens. At the present time there are nearly six thousand unnaturalized foreign born persons receiving instructions in the WPA citizenship classes throughout the state.

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


