lege in Ohio for the second semester. He had been attending New Trier high school in Winnetka this fall where he was taking a post graduate course.

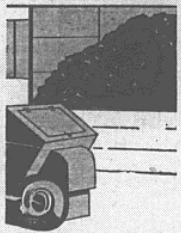
The Soup club will meet on Friday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Hughes.

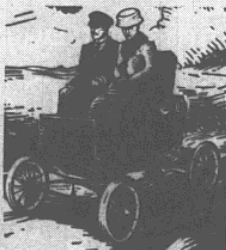
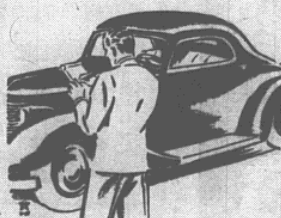
