986 Pleasure Car Licenses Sold in Village in 1932

The number of village vehicle tags sold in 1932 was 986 for pleasure cars and 149 for trucks, a total of 1135, according to a report received from A. C. Burdick, village clerk. The number of pleasure car tags sold outstanding before the houses in the village of Barrington (there being approximately 525 houses).

There were 217 dog tags sold during 1932.

An indication that 1933 will at least equal the totals of 1932 can be taken from the early sale of vehicle tags at present. Mr. Burdick reported a high daily sale of licenses. To date 115 pleasure cars and 24 truck licenses have been distributed.
