

Lake County House Building Future Is Good, Experts Say

February was a good month for residential building contracts in the Lake county area. They were far ahead of the January figures, and overshadowed the average gain for most of the county. T. O. Morgan, Chicago manager of the Dodge reports division of F. W. Dodge corporation, points out that "residential building contracts made up most of the Lake county picture total for February. In a survey of the 37 eastern states, it was found that residential contracts moved to the 40-million-dollar mark in February, from 35-million in January. The current general emphasis on home-building is credited with a large part of that gain."

In a grouping of all types of building and construction, the February total for the Lake county area was \$76,000. The privately financed February contracts in the Lake area reached \$74,000. The publicly financed contracts amounted to \$2000.

The movement in residential contracts during February, with a total of \$59,000, gave the month a sharp rise over January's \$14,000. This gain in Lake county was far ahead of the average gain of 10 per cent recorded for the 37 states.

Commencing Death Sentences

After much argument and discussion, the legislature passed a law giving the state's chief executive the power to reprieve and commutation of sentence. Lewis' sentence was changed to life imprisonment.

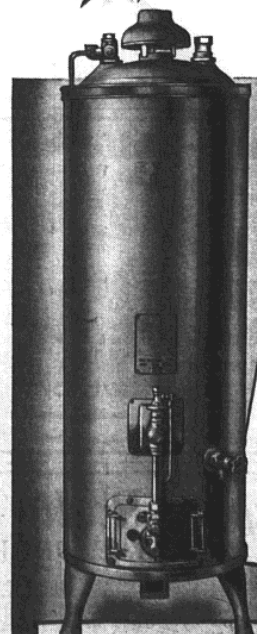
