Fork, Rake, Hoe Are Only Tools Needed for Gardeners

A spading fork, a rake and a hoe are about the only tools the backyard gardener needs, says B. L. Weaver, of the department of horticulture, college of agriculture, University of Illinois.

With these tools it is possible to work the entire area of a small garden, leaving no waste space at the sides and ends. If the garden is fenced, some crops such as late peas, pole beans, tomatoes or cucumbers may be planted or set close to the fence and be supported by the fence itself, Weaver explained.

In a small garden it is important to utilize all the available space throughout the season. By planning the garden in advance and using companion and succession plantings, two or three crops may be grown on the same ground the same season.

For example radishes need not be planted in separate rows, but may be used to mark the rows of seed onions or parsnips. They make possible early cultivation, aid in the control of weeds and are pulled before damage has been done to their companion crop.

Early planting of peas may be followed by string beans. The beans are removed to make room for kale, lettuce, turnips or radishes. The various combinations that may be used are numerous, and an attraction to garden operations and if well planned will keep every foot of the small garden busy throughout the season.

With those crops requiring only a small area for development of each plant, the rows may be planted as close as possible and still permit cultivation. It is usually necessary to thin the plants in the row to allow sufficient space for their proper development. This is especially important with root crops, Weaver warns. However, crowding of such crops as cabbage may be desirable when the family is small and when the number of cabbages is more important than the total yield.

"There is no better form of outdoor exercise than moderate working in the home garden, and few lines of recreational work will give greater returns for the time employed," Weaver said.
