

Spanish-American War Film Coming: All-Star Cast

"Joette" and "The Toy Wife" to Be at the Catlow Next Week

When Lewis Stone went into his role as an army surgeon in the Philippines during the Spanish-American War, the part he plays in "Yellow Jack," coming to the Catlow on Friday and Saturday, the uniform he wore was the last word in authenticity. For the veteran actor were the uniform in which he actually had served in Cuba. Stone had enlisted with the New York volunteers and served for the duration of the war.

His experience enabled Stone to offer valuable technical advice to Robert Montgomery and Virginia Bruce, who are co-starred in the new drama, Montgomery as the heroic soldier who offers himself as a living sacrifice to the cause of stamping out yellow fever, and Miss Bruce as the nurse who accompanies the expedition to the island of Cuba.
