## Jewel Tea Reports 3.46 Per Cent Sales Increase Over 1937

Jewel Tea Co., Inc. reports that its sales for the four weeks ending July 15, 1938, were \$1,111,973.43 as compared with \$1,111,580.73 for parallel weeks in 1937, an increase of .86 per cent. Sales for the first 28 weeks of 1938 were \$12,765,888.60 as compared with \$12,542,292.37 for a like period in 1937, an increase of 2.46 per cent.

## Library News

If circulation statistics tell what people like to do more and more during the summer months, then we know that they like to read, for again we have a monthly gain of 145 books over last month, and a gain of 520 books over July of last year.

We now have available at the library, 5,425 books for adults and 1,845 books for children and young people. There are 589 adult borrowers and 392 borrowers among the children. Out of this group, 50 adult cards and 24 children's cards are held by rural borrowers.

There were 1469 adult books withdrawn and 608 children's books withdrawn in July. Of the adult books, 1,121 were fiction and 348 non-fiction. The largest daily circulation was 160 books.

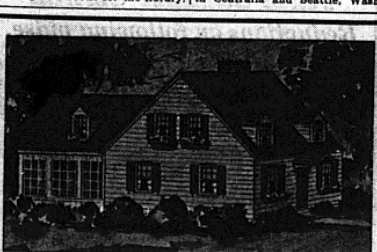

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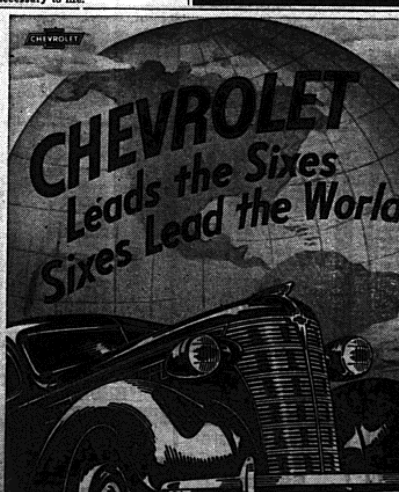
