Tongue, Teeth Have to Do With Voice, Word Sounds. There is a definite relationship between many speech defects, dental ahonormalities, and various conditions in the mouth. Voice or word counds are produced by a certain and eart palate, teeth, cheeks and lips, with the tongue and the passage of expired air from the lungs. A change in the volume and resonance of expired air is varied by the larynx.

The development of vowel sounds requires only the opening of the lips with a slight tongue motion. Consonants require somewhat more complicated movements of the lips complicated movements of the lips and tongue and are named accord-ing to the part of the mouth used in their formation, namely, dental, lingual, nasal, guttural and libial.

A number of mouth conditions affect speech habits very noticeably, according to a writer in the Detroit News. The overshot jaw is a very common cause of speech defects.

The projection of the upper anterior teeth prevents good articulation with the lower anterior teeth.

The undershot jaw also affects the speech shabits through changing the relationship of the tip of the tongue to the teeth. If both cases it is difficult for the lips to shape propents to the teeth.
