

Leaders Say More Sales Effort Can Bring Prosperity

Local Men Attend Big Meeting at Stevens Hotel Tuesday

Enough buyers are available to put business of the country back on the 1929 basis, according to national business leaders who spoke to 1600 executives and salesmen attending the Chicago meeting Tuesday of the National Salesmen's Crusade organization at the Stevens hotel.

All that is necessary to bring back prosperity for salesmen and sales organizations in every community to shake off the jitters and go out and make sales.

The salesmen's crusade was originated by George W. Mason, president of the Nash-Kelvinator corporation. Mr. Mason first tried out his experiment of creating jobs by increasing sales at Lincoln, Neb. The meeting at Lincoln, plus a lot of sales work in all lines popped up business there. Similar campaigns to stimulate recovery will be held in many other large centers. The Chicago campaign is the second.

George H. Davis, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, presided at the Stevens hotel session.

He declared a triumph over the psychological depression can be achieved by the salesmen, resulting in putting millions back to work.

Chicago Motorist Dies of Injuries Received in Crash

F. Schlemann, 4137 W. North avenue, Chicago, died late Thursday night at the Palatine Community hospital of injuries received when the car he was driving hit the pavement on Rand road, 3 miles southeast of Lake Zurich, and crashed into a ditch. The accident occurred early Thursday morning. A verdict of accidental death was returned at an inquest conducted in Chicago Friday morning.

Schlemann, who received severe head injuries when he was thrown to the pavement from the open roadster he was driving, was accompanied by four other Chicago men. They had been visiting at a resort at Diamond Lake, it was reported, and were enroute home when the car failed to negotiate a sharp curve.

His wife, Louise, died five years ago.

Rescue Two Youth Sunday

Two youths, one who became exhausted while swimming in Beverly lake, in the southwest section of Barrington township, and a companion who went to his aid, nearly lost their lives Sunday afternoon.

They were rescued by several fishermen who were fishing nearby. The youths are: Walter Dittmer, 2321 Seventy-fourth court, Elmwood Park, and Mitchell Kyana, 3020 Neenah street, Chicago, both 20 years old.

Both youths were revived within a short time after they were removed from the lake, but suffered considerably from shock and were brought to the Sherman hospital in Elgin for observation. They were released later in the day.

Dittmer, Kyana and several other young men were spending the day at Beverly lake, on Higgins road, and about three in the afternoon Dittmer and Kyana went in swimming.

Although both were able to swim, it was the first time that they had entered the water this spring. Dittmer swam a distance from shore and became exhausted. Calling for aid, he attempted to turn back to shore. Kyana went to his rescue and reached him just as he disappeared beneath the surface, but he too was weakened and was unable to help his companion beyond keeping him afloat.

Dittmer was unconscious when pulled into the boat and Kyana was in an exhausted condition. After being revived on shore they were taken to the hospital.

Four Motorists Hurt in Car Crash Sunday

Two motorists were seriously injured and two others bruised and shaken up in a two-car collision at the intersection of route 52 and Barrington road, about two miles south of Barrington, Sunday morning.

Two of the injured were taken to the Sherman hospital in Elgin by ambulance. They were: Miss Mary Voske, 20 years old, 840 N. Lawndale avenue, Chicago, who suffered a fractured pelvis, and Edmund F. Radkiewicz, 19 years old, 6701 W. Roosevelt road, Berwyn, who was severely lacerated and bruised about the face, head and body.

The couple was driving west on route 62 when a machine driven by Elmer H. Schoening, 20 years old, of Wooddale, traveling south on Barrington road, failed to stop for the stop sign and crashed into their car. Schoening and his wife, Pearl, 24 years old, escaped with less serious injuries.

State Highway Patrolman William Gallagher investigated the crash. Schoening was held later on the charge of violating a state traffic regulation. Miss Voske was transferred to a Chicago hospital by ambulance Sunday afternoon while Radkiewicz was taken to his home.
