

## To Dispatch Mail From Barrington Sunday Evenings

New Convenient Service Will Be Started Here May 22

Barrington will have Sunday mail dispatching service beginning this week-end, according to an announcement from L. B. Paddock, postmaster.

The Sunday mail will close at 6 p. m. The post office lobby will be open from 5 to 6 o'clock and there will be a pick-up from all collection boxes between 5 and 5:15 p. m.

The Sunday service will be for

first class mail only, including air mail. No parcel post, registered or insured articles will be handled, and there will be no window service.

This extra service and convenience for local patrons has been wanted by businessmen and other residents of the community for years. Requests for it were filed with the department by local individuals and committees several years ago.

The fact that up to this time, letters mailed after 5:30 p. m. Saturday have lain in the post office until Monday morning indicates the degree of service improvement resulting from the addition of Sunday dispatching.

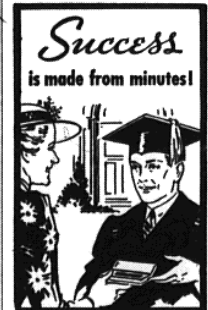

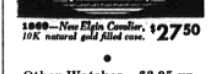
