## Frank Cerny Tells of Poor Conditions Under Hitler Rule

Gets Close-Up of Conquer During 4-Month Stay in Central Europe

Deception, intimidation, contrivance and persecution as practiced by Chancellor Adolph Hitter of Germany, in his recent struggles to conquer his neighboring state in Europe were described by Frank Cerny, 133 Ecorge street who has just returned following four months spent in Germany Austria, Czechoslovakia and Rusria.
