R. Church Declares New Dealers Are the Real Reactionaries

Congressman Ralph E. Church, republican candidate for re-election, scored democrats of congress as reactionaries in his Lake county appearance this week.

Pointing to the NRA, the court packing plan, and the government reorganization bill, Cong. Church declared each of the measures was "designed to destroy the liberties of the American people."

"The NRA," he declared, "denied people the right to run their businesses and gave centralized control to one individual in Washington."

This was identical to reactionary European governments where one-man control, dictatorship, despotism and war tyranny prevail.

"The supreme court packing attempt was reactionary to the utmost, mistreating the common people's ability to amend their constitution. This attempt at centralized, dictatorial, one-man control by the chief executive, had it succeeded, would have destroyed liberalism in America."

"Another outstanding dictatorial measure of this past session was the government reorganization bill. It mistreated representatives of the people. It represented the worst type of reactionary legislation in that it gave full power to reorganize."
