## Ray F. Gieske Crash Victim; Funeral Rites Wednesday

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the late residence, 308 S Cook street, Barrington, for Ray F. Gieske, 33-year old Barrington business man who died the victim of an automobile accident Saturday night near Melrose Park which also claimed the life of John A. DeLap of Maywood and sent three others seriously injured to the Westlake hospital at Melrose Park.

Services were conducted at the residence and later at the Salem Evangelical church, with the Rev. W. A. Stauffer officiating, assisted by Rev. L. C. Schmidt, district superintendent, and Dr. J. C. Spencer, pastor of the First Methodist church of Elgin. A quartet from the Elgin church rendered vocal selections. Interment was in Evergreen cemetery.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Lake street and Wolf road in Proviso township. Mr. Gieske, accompanied by Willard Grabenkort, 137 Lincoln avenue, Barrington; Miss Helen Nelson, 1006 Touhy avenue, Park Ridge, and Miss Velba Frautuck, 424 Billings street, Elgin, were travel-

ing east on Lake street, and the DeLap machine was going south on Wolf road when the crash occurred.

According to police the DeLap machine struck the Barrington car

## Aged Pedestrian Found on Roadside, Hit and Run Victim

Stanley Marcinkowski, 80, of 4436 N Marmora avenue, Chicago, is in the Cook county hospital with a fractured leg and shoulder and numerous other injuries suffered Monday when he was struck by an unidentified motorist on Rand road about a half a mile south of Palatine road.

Marcinkowski was found on the road side early Monday morning by Emil Spletzer, residing on Rand road near Palatine. He was taken to the Northwestern hospital at Des Plaines and then transferred to the county hospital.

In addition to the fractured leg and shoulder, hospital authorities said the aged man had received a broken wrist and numerous bruises and lacerations.

Marcinkowski, suffering from senility, strayed from his home in Chicago Sunday, it was said.

## Former Barrington Woman Escapes Drowning at Grove

Tobias L. Peterson, 44, Chicago real estate broker, was drowned in a drainage canal near Fox River Grove Monday night, and Mrs. Bernard J. Maloy, until a few weeks ago a resident of Barrington, escaped drowning when she managed to crawl from the partly submerged automobile in which the two had been riding, and swam to safety.

The accident occurred in the Gardner subdivision near Fox River Grove at midnight.

Peterson and Mrs. Maloy were waiting for the latter's husband to return from Chicago on a late train when they engaged in a friendly argument over the pronunciation of a word. When they learned the train was late, they started for the Maloy home to look the word up in a dictionary.

Peterson was unfamiliar with the roads in the subdivision and his car went over a retaining wall, tipping upside down in a canal which contained approximately 8 feet of water.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning. Mrs. Maloy was unable to attend the inquest because of shock and exposure.

He attended local schools, graduating from the Barrington High School and the University of Illinois, where he was a soloist with the University Glee Club for two years. Possessed of an exceptional tenor voice, Mr. Gieske was a recognized singer. Recently he had been doing reproduction work for the Skelly Oil Company as a member of a quartet. His voice had been heard over the radio frequently and he was in great demand by local churches and other organizations.

Assuming charge of the Barrington Laundry following the death of his father about nine years ago, Mr. Gieske ably managed that concern and about three years ago started the Band Box Cleaners in Elgin. For the past year or so his brother, Edward, has been associated with him as a partner in the two concerns.

Besides his brother, Mr. Gieske is survived by a number of relatives, including J. S. Gieske and Dr. A. G. Gieske, uncles, of Barrington.

# CANNING by the new Gas Oven way

• Canning the new oven way has done away with all special equipment and simplified the entire canning process for the modern cook. Foods prepared by this new method will be more colorful and perfectly shaped as well.

Acid foods, including all fruits and tomatoes, may be cold packed and processed in the oven, because all bacteria present in these foods are rendered inactive when subjected to a temperature of 212° F. Food is packed in sterilized jars and covered with a syrup which has been brought to a boil. A thin syrup—one part sugar to three parts water—is used for small fruits. A medium syrup—one part sugar to two parts water—is suitable for small sour fruits; while a heavy syrup—one part sugar to one part water—is used for larger fruits which are to be very sweet. Screw

covers on jars not too tightly and place in oven, being sure jars do not touch to allow circulation of heat. Set oven regulator at 250° F. and cook for one hour. A higher temperature causes syrup to boil too vigorously and cook away, leaving fruit uncovered.

Vegetables and meats, which are alkaline foods and in which bacteria and moulds thrive at the boiling point, must either be pre-cooked, packed hot and then processed immediately, or packed cold and processed in a pressure cooker where a temperature of above 212° F. is obtainable.

The windows of the corner drug stores are full of gay pencils, sober note-books and important looking pads because children of all ages will soon be trudging back to school. Neat lunch kits cleverly equipped with thermos bottles fill a corner of the window too since many children carry their lunches with them.

Of course there are thousands of schools throughout the country which provide cafeterias directed by women especially trained in nutrition and lunch room management where healthful lunches, carefully planned and prepared may be purchased for a small sum. These cafeterias relieve the mother from the actual work of preparing her child's meal but the responsibility is still hers for the luncheon must supplement the other family meals and make a perfect whole.

When a lunch box must be packed every morning the menu should

be planned the day before in order to avoid a mad scramble at the last minute. Keep heavy wax-paper paraffin cups with covers and paper napkins in a convenient place so the packing will be as easy as possible. Sandwiches, a hot soup or drink, raw vegetable such as celery and radishes, fresh fruit, cookies, cup cake dates, dates, a piece of milk chocolate—these foods are

One hot food should always be included in a child's luncheon so that easy and rapid digestion will take place. ited to cream soups and hot milk drinks when the thermos bottle is used.
